- **1.** Say it: meh-HEE-koh. The day is Día de la Independencia (dee-ah deh lah een-deh-pen-DEN-see-ah
- 2. The big day is September 16.
- 3. It remembers 1810, when Miguel Hidalgo rang a church bell in the town of Dolores.
- 4. That call is the Grito de Dolores—the "Cry for Independence."
- **5.** Celebrations start the night of September 15 with the Grito in town squares.
- 6. In Mexico City, the President shouts "¡Viva México!" and rings a bell from a balcony.
- **7.** Crowds wave green-white-red flags and shout "¡Viva!" back.
- **8.** The flag shows an eagle on a cactus holding a snake—a famous legend.
- **9.** Streets fill with papel picado (colorful cut paper), lights, and fireworks.
- 10. Music time: mariachi bands and folk dances like the Mexican Hat Dance.
- 11. Favorite foods include chiles en nogada (flag colors!), pozole, and elote (corn with toppings).
- 12. Kids paint cheeks with flag colors and wear small sombreros or ribbons.
- **13.** Many towns have parades, school shows, and band marches.
- People say "¡Viva la independencia!" which means "Long live independence!"
- **15.** Fun tip: This is not Cinco de Mayo—that's a different holiday in May.
